Feedback Analysis and Recommendations Report for the year 2021 – 2022.

The Feedback Analysis Committee of the university designs and collects feedback from its stakeholders to evaluate and monitor the quality on curriculum. The feedback forms were collected from the students, faculty, employers, and alumni.

The feedback targets for the different stakeholders which are as follows:

1) Students

For students, it addressed curriculum and its learning-related issues in terms of quality, competency, disciplinary knowledge, research related skills, critical thinking, analytical reasoning, cooperation, teamwork, communication skills, moral, ethical values, digital literacy, employability, entrepreneurship, skill development, leadership qualities, professional and decision making skills, experiential and lifelong learning, cross-cutting issues like – gender, professional ethics, human values, Sustainable Development Goals, environment and sustainability.

2) Faculty

For faculty, the feedback focused on issues like the suitability of the course, on need-based outcome of the curriculum, inculcating moral and ethical values in the students, disciplinary knowledge, and research related skills, communication skills, digital literacy of the students, experiential and life-long learning of the students, developing entrepreneurship and employability skills of the students, students being able to address cross-cutting issues like -gender, professional ethics, human values, Sustainable Development Goals, environment and sustainability.

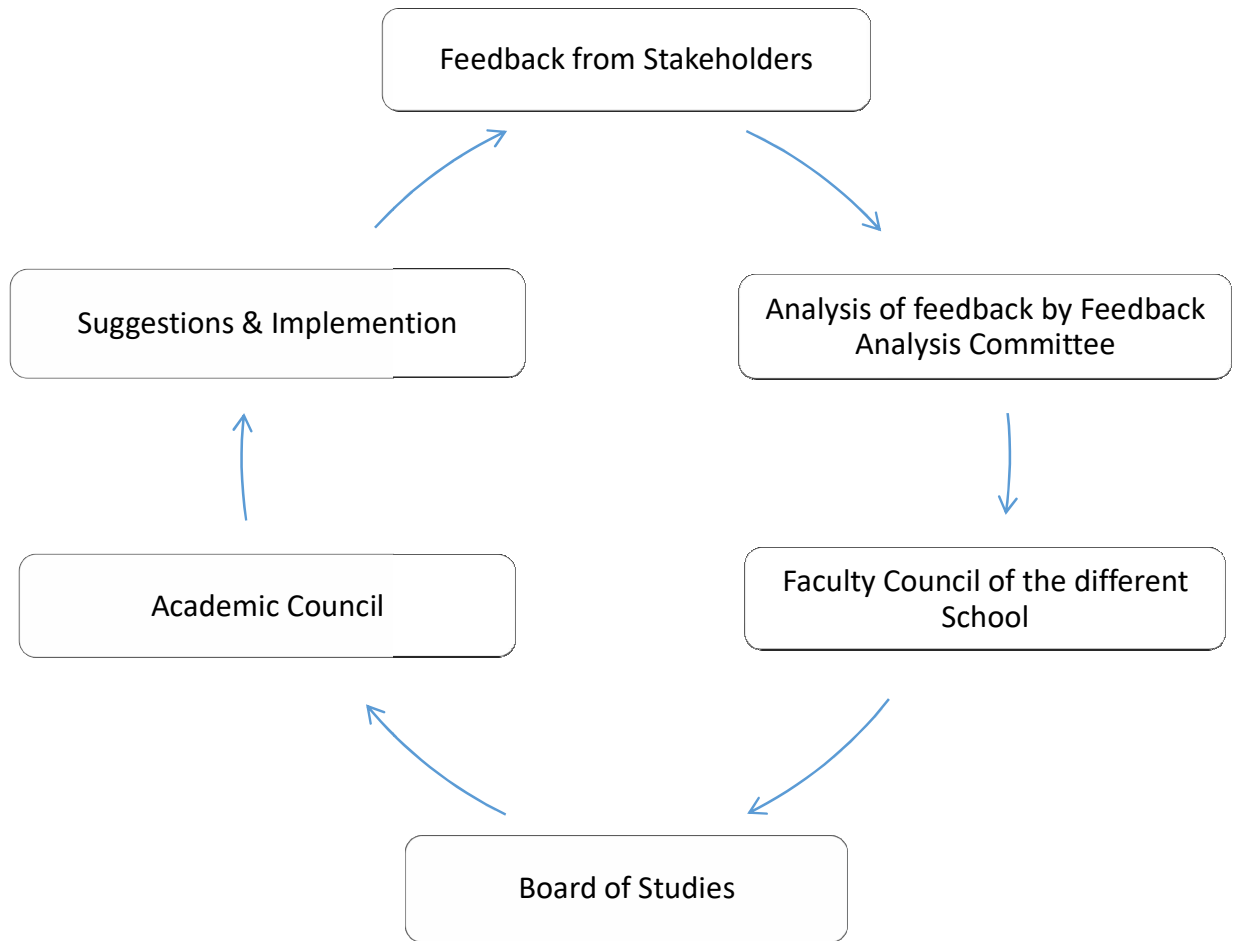
3) Employers

For employers, it addresses issues like professional behaviour, encourages digital literacy, inculcates critical thinking, communication skills, teamwork, and as per the local and global needs. 4) Alumni

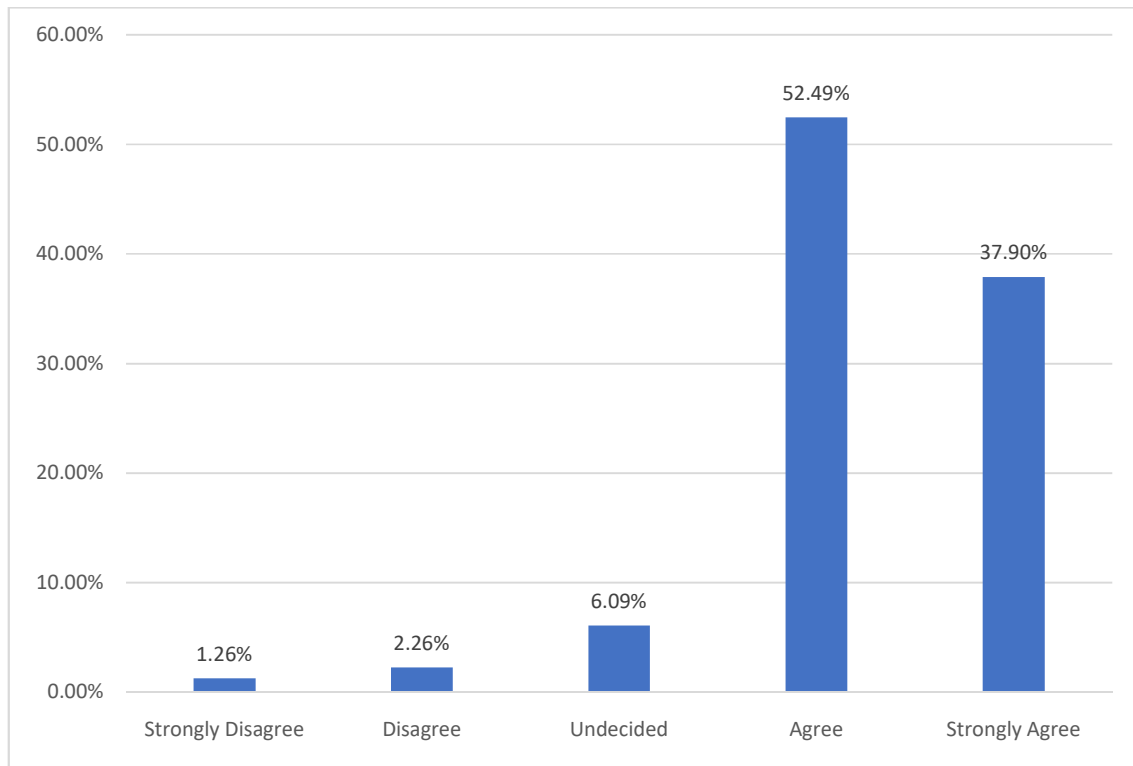


Figure 1.1Based on the responses received it was observed that 37% of the respondents strongly agree, 52.49% agree that the curriculum is well structured and instils moral and ethical values, 6.09% are undecided, 2.26% disagree whereas 1.26% strongly disagree.

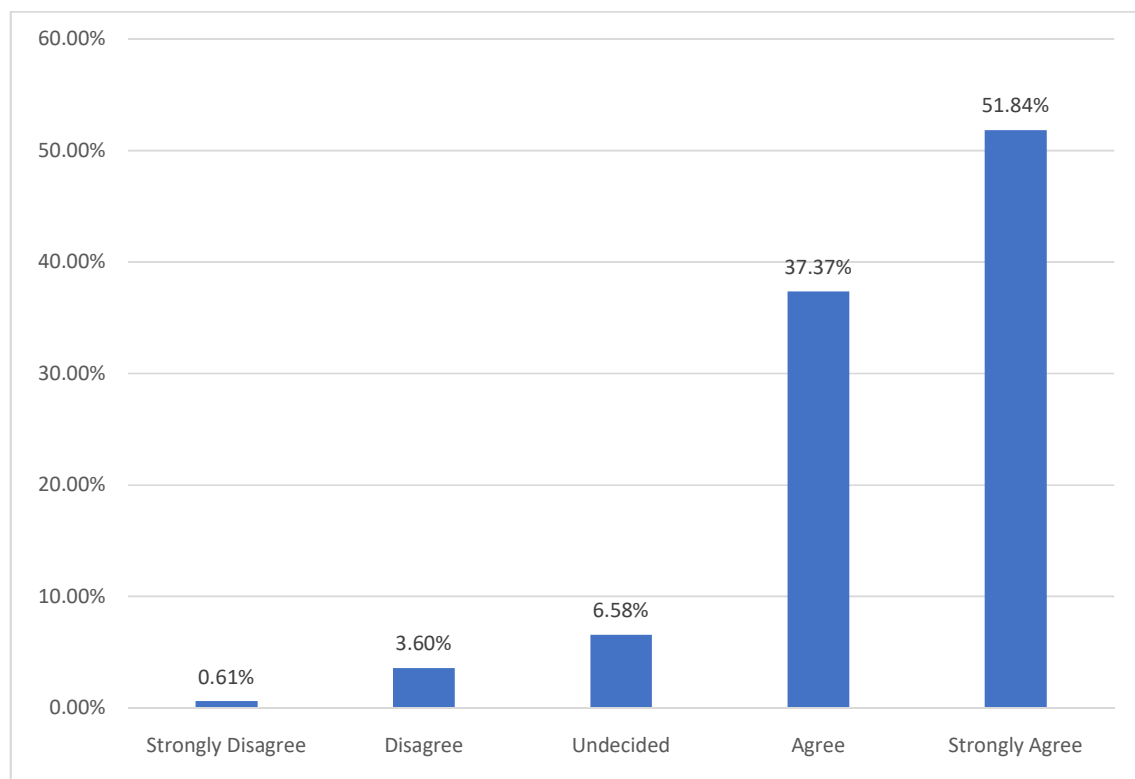


Figure 1.2 It was observed that 51.84% strongly agreed that the curriculum provides disciplinary knowledge and enhances research related skills, 37.37% agree, 6.58% undecided, 3.60% disagree that the curriculum provides adequate disciplinary knowledge and enhances research related skills, whereas 0.61% strongly disagree.

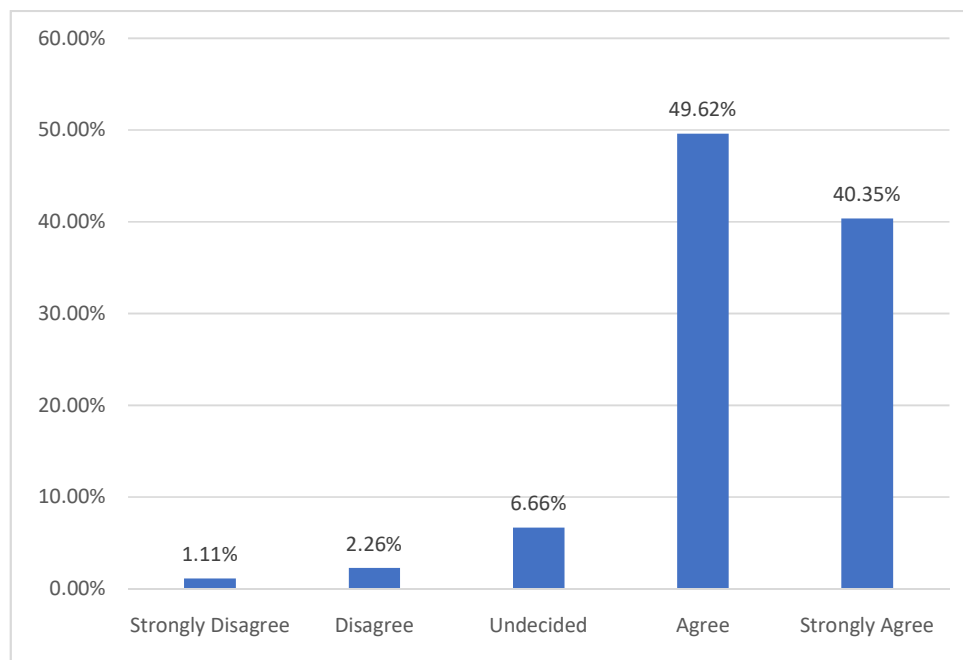


Figure 1.3Based on the responses received for question no 3, it was observed that 40.35% strongly agree that the curriculum improves communication skills, 49.62% of the respondents agree, whereas 6.66% are undecided. 2.26% respondents disagree and lastly 1.11% strongly disagree that the curriculum improves communication skills.

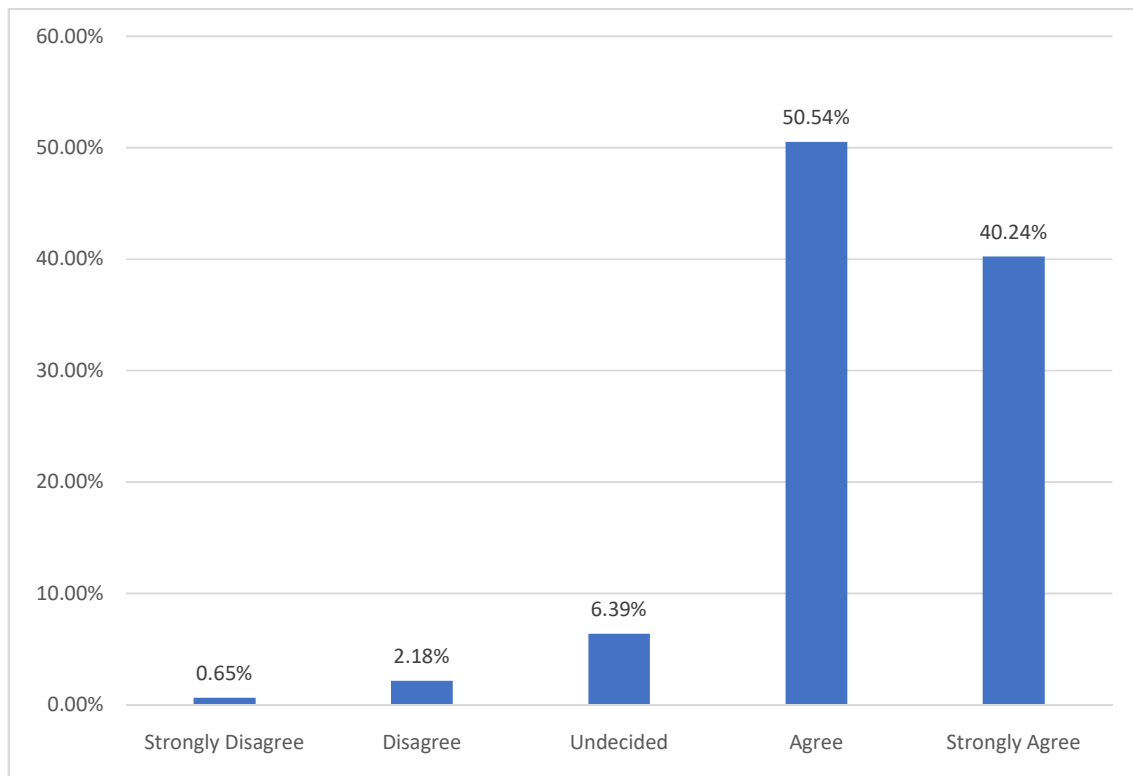


Figure 1.4 Shows that the curriculum encourages critical thinking, problem-solving and analytical reasoning. From the data received it was observed that 40.24% respondents strongly agree, 50.54% agree, 6.39% remain undecided, 2.18% of the total respondents disagree whereas 0.65% strongly disagree.

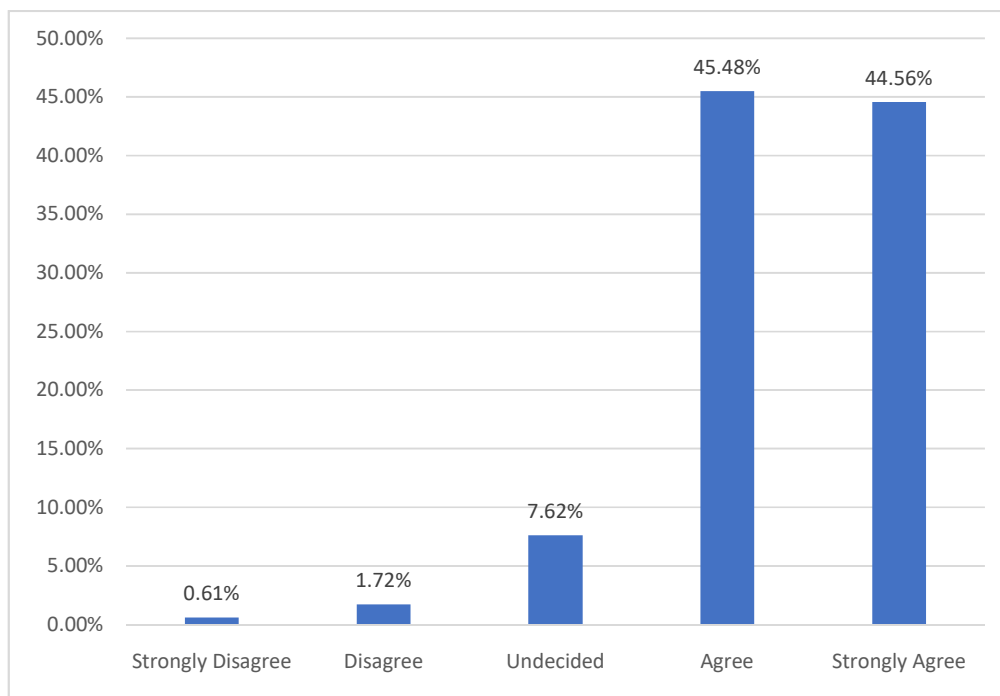


Figure 1.5 It was founded that 44.56% strongly agree that the curriculum teaches cooperation and teamwork, 45.48% agree, 7.62% undecided, 1.72% disagree that the curriculum teaches co-operation and teamwork and 0.61% of the total respondents strongly disagree.

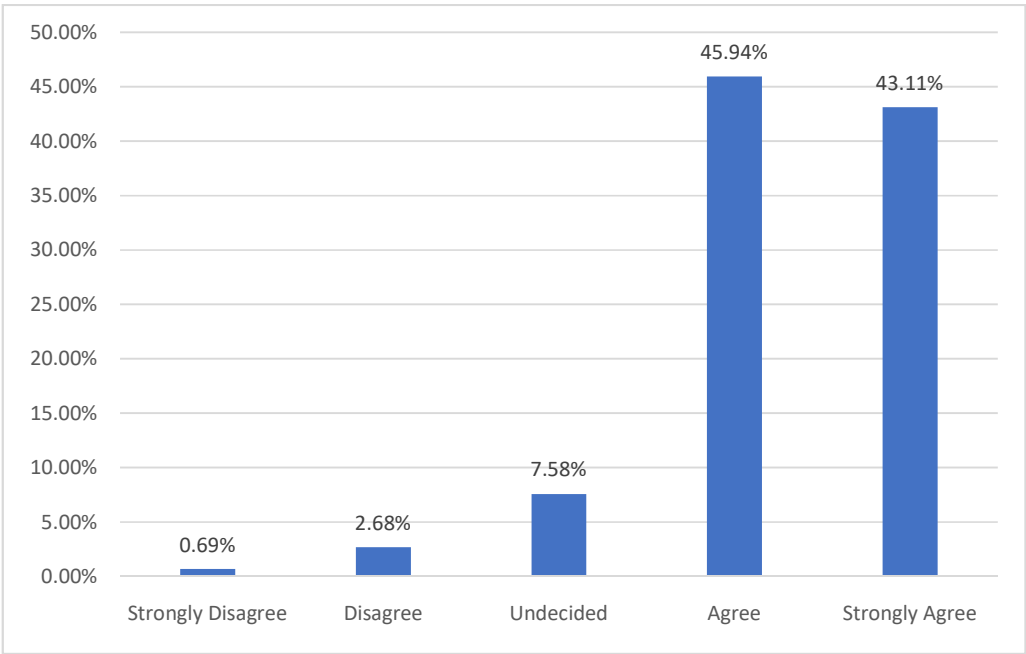


Figure 1.6It was observed that 43.11% strongly agree, 45.94% agree, 7.58% of the respondents were found to be undecided, 2.68% disagree and 0.69% strongly disagree that the curriculum provides training on digital literacy.

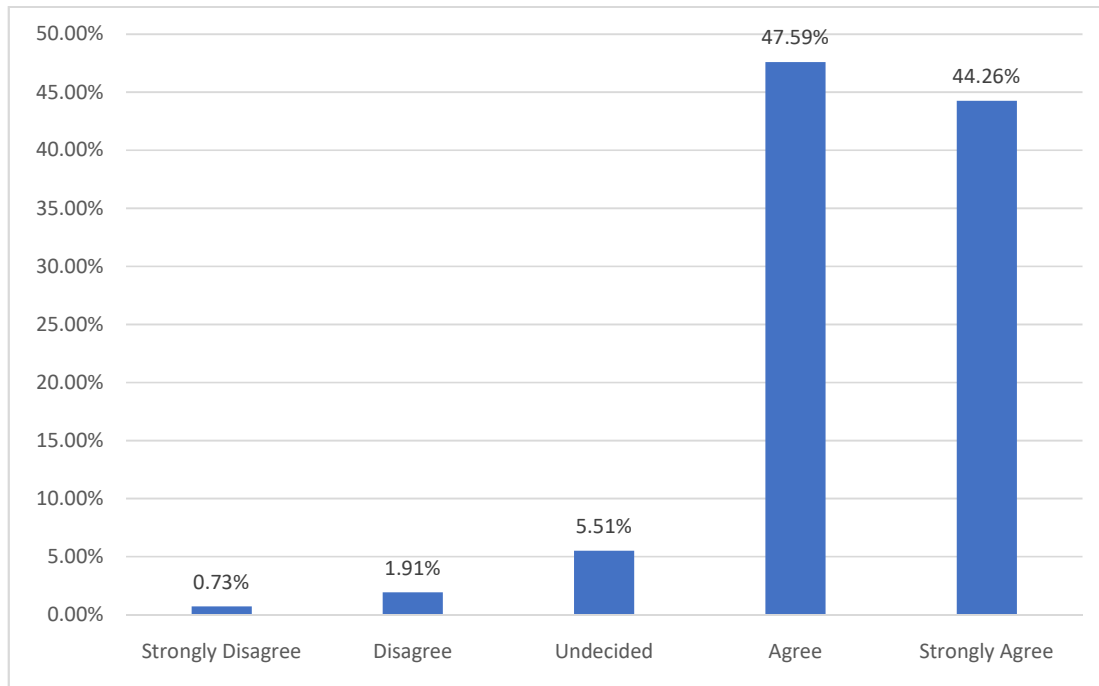


Figure 1.7 The data received was observed that 44.26% of the students strongly agree, 47.59% agree, 5.51% are undecided, 1.91% of the respondents disagree and lastly 0.73% strongly disagree that the curriculum inculcates experiential and lifelong learning.

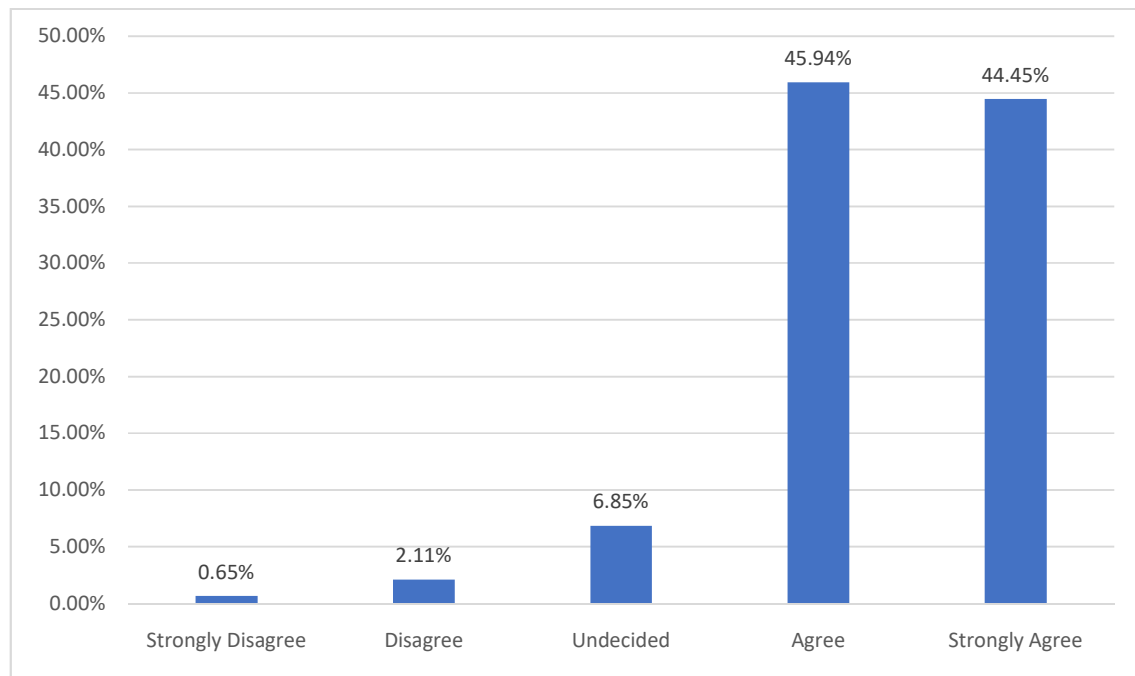


Figure 1.8 It was observed that 44.45% strongly agree, 45.94% agree, 6.85% undecided, 2.11% disagree whereas 0.65% of the students strongly disagree that the curriculum imbibes leadership qualities, professional and decision-making skills.

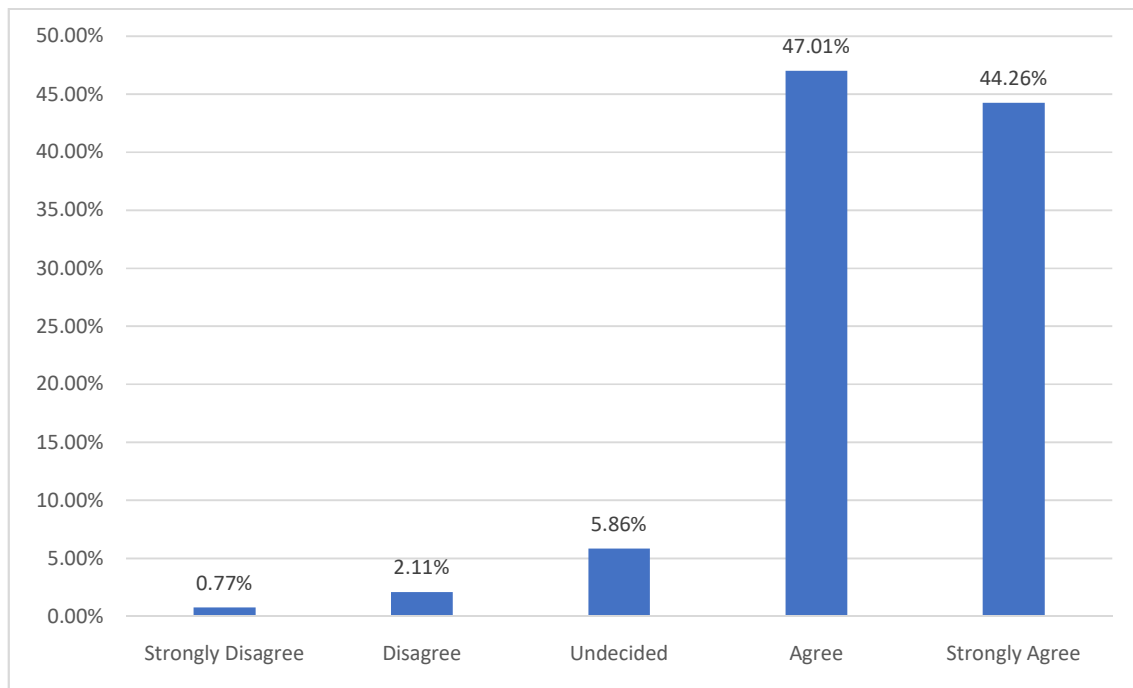


Figure 1.9As per the data received, it was observed that 44.26% of the students strongly agree, 47.01% agree, 5.86% undecided, 2.11% disagree and 0.77% of the total respondents strongly disagree that the curriculum encourages entrepreneurship, employability and skill development.

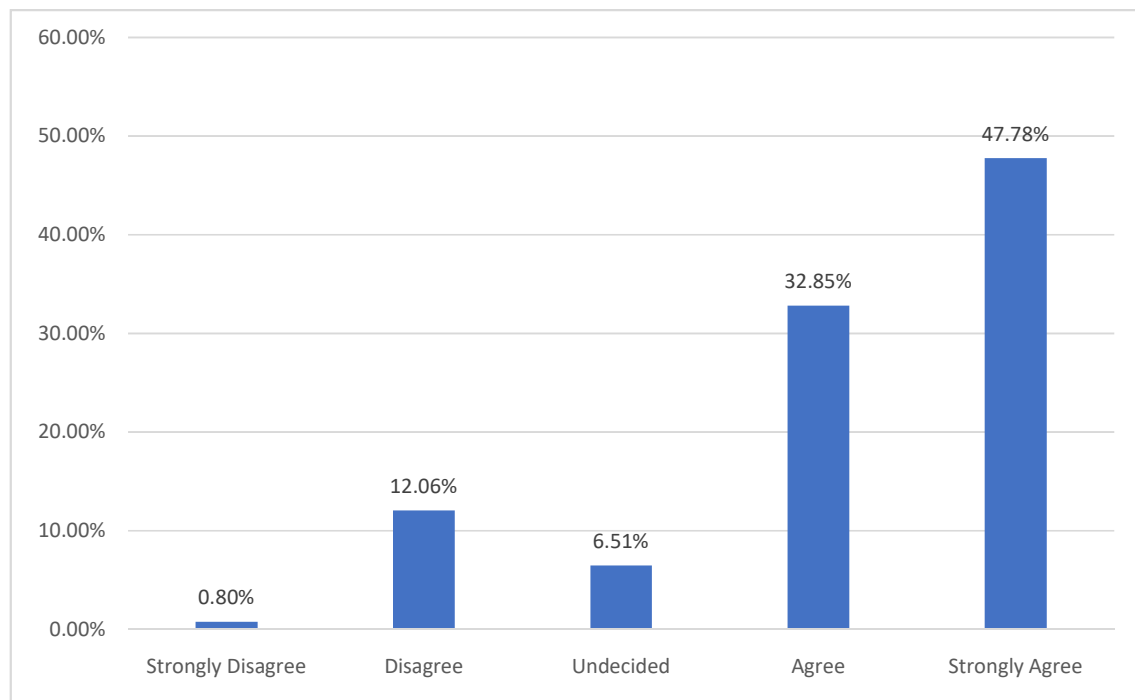


Figure 1.10 Shows that 47.78% of the students strongly agree that the curriculum addresses cross-cutting issues, 32.85% agree, 6.51% undecided, 12.06% disagree and 0.80% strongly disagree.

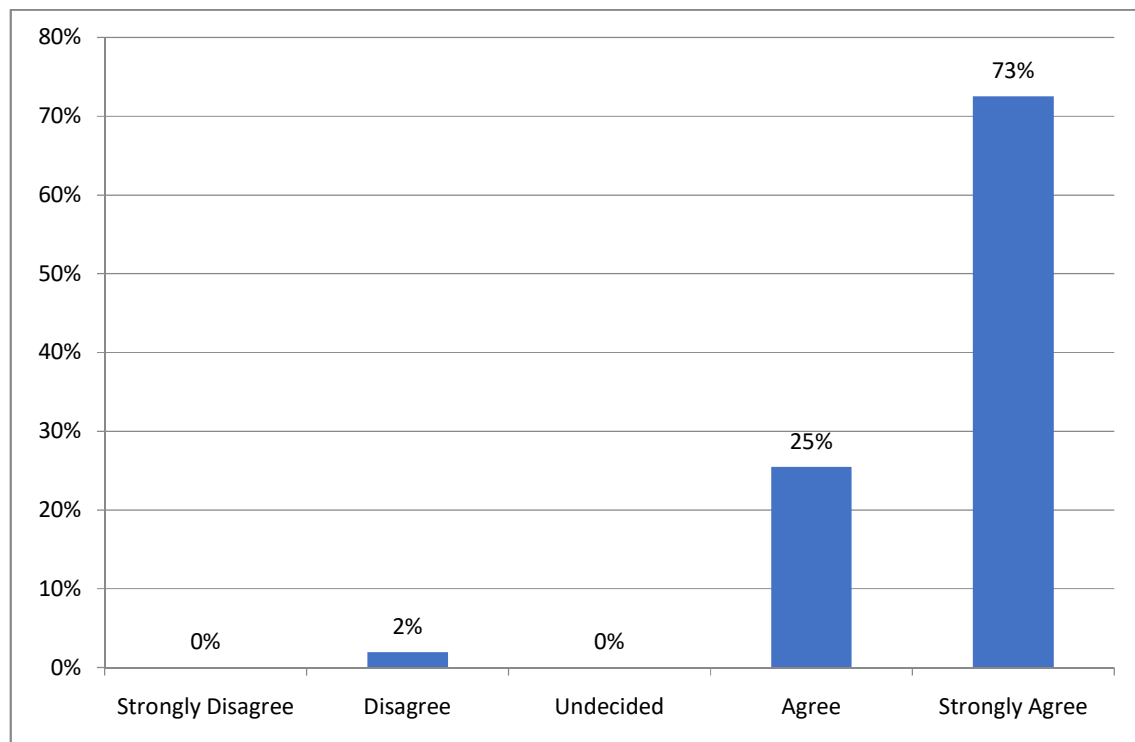


Figure 2.1 From the above figure it was observed that 73% faculty strongly agree, 25% agree, 0 % undecided, 2% said that they disagree and 0 % strongly disagree on the curriculum has helped in grooming the students and inculcating moral and ethical values in them.

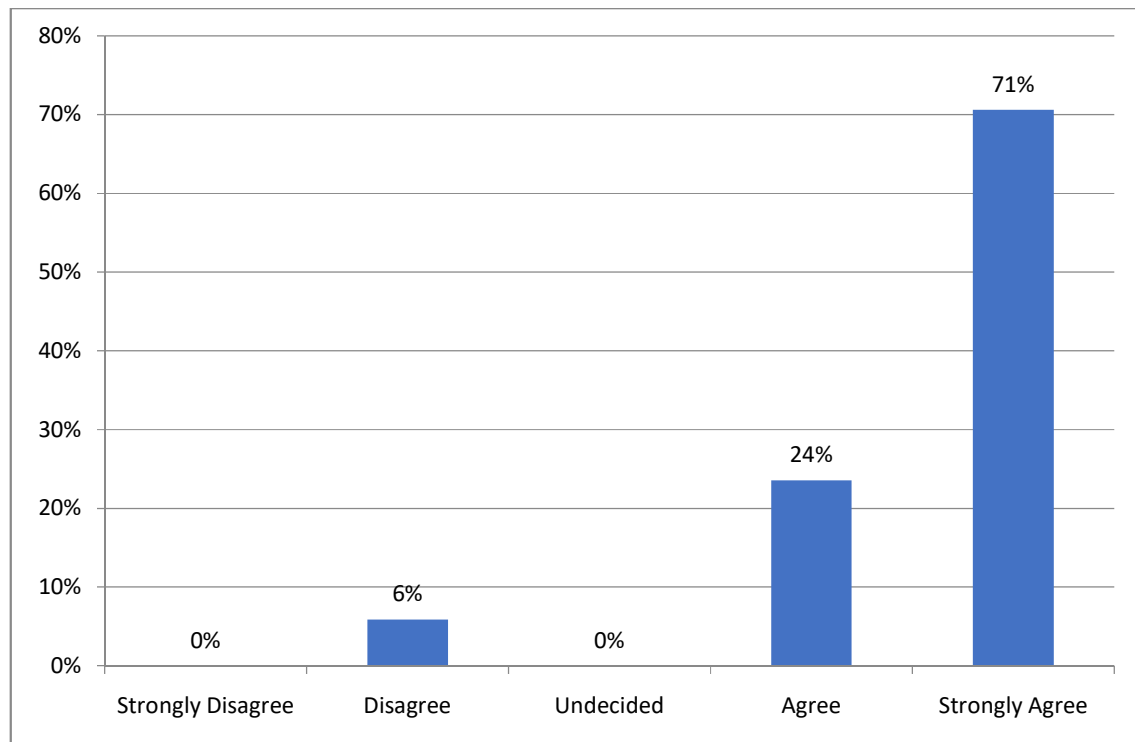


Figure 2.2 States that 71% of the faculty members strongly agree that the curriculum has contributed to developing disciplinary knowledge and research related skills, 24% agree, 0% are undecided, 6% disagree whereas 0% strongly disagree.

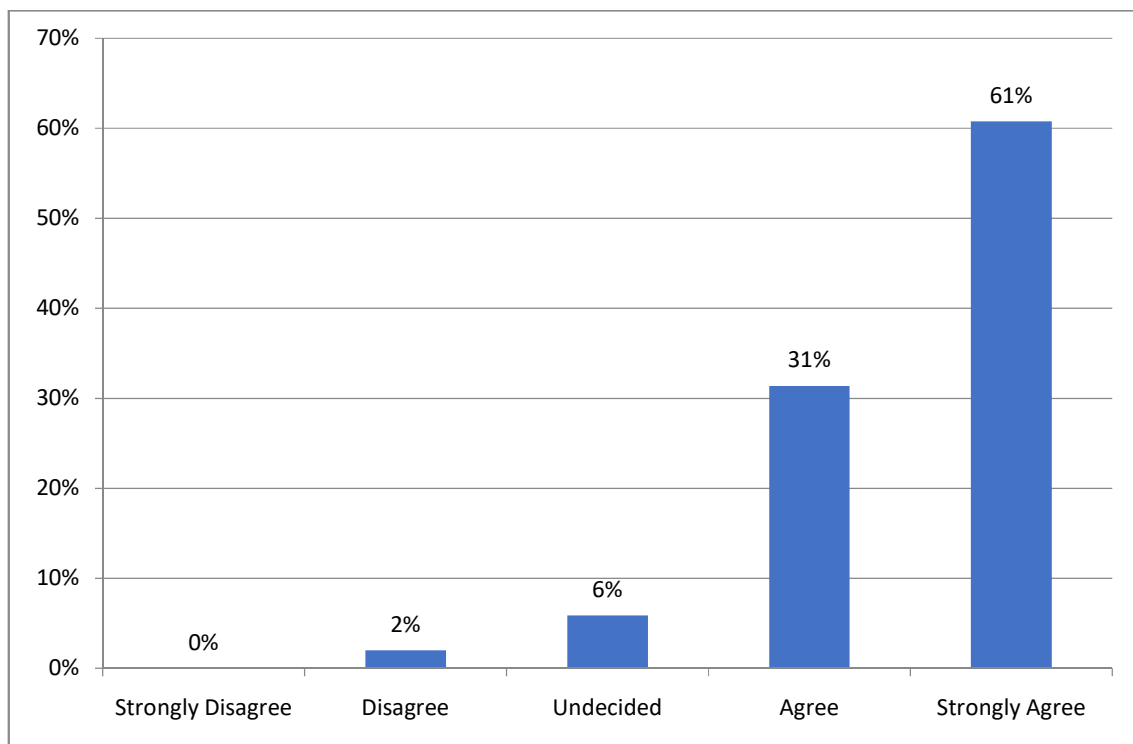


Figure 2.3 States that 61% strongly agree, 31% agree, 6% undecided, 2% disagree and 0% strongly disagree on the curriculum has enhanced the communication skills of the students.

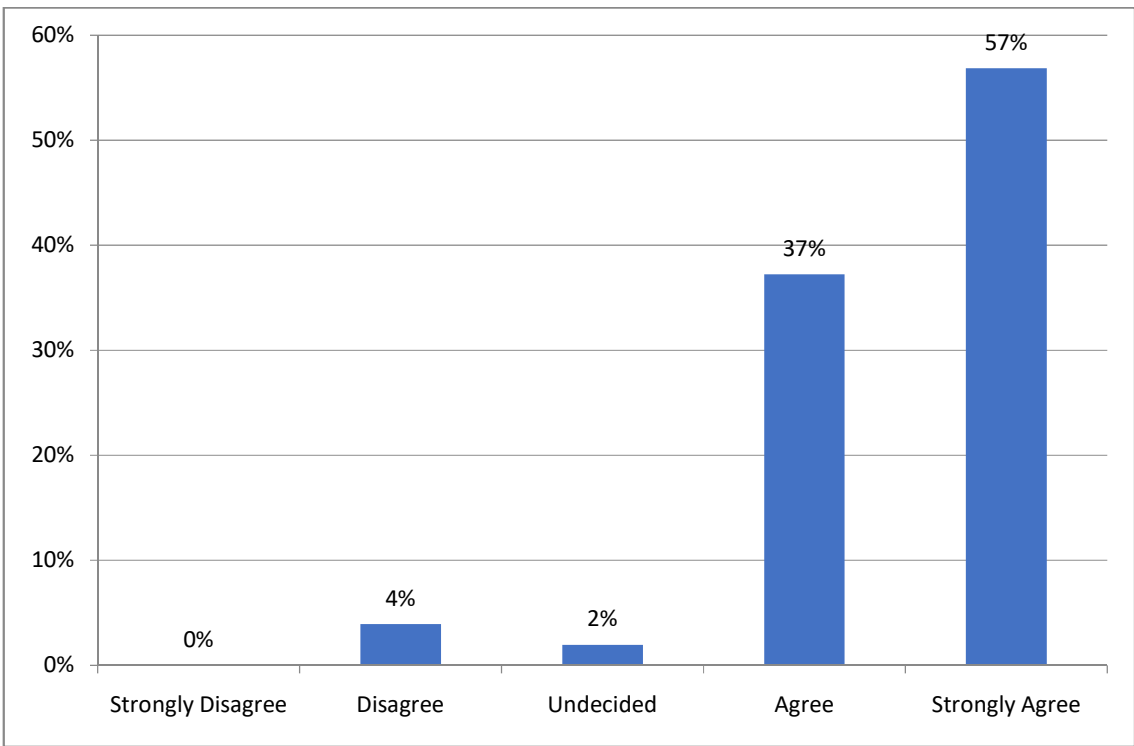


Figure 2.4It was observed that 57% faculty strongly agreeon the curriculum has infused critical thinking, problem-solving, and analytical reasoning in the students., 37% agree, 2% undecided, 4% of the faculty members disagree and 0% strongly disagree.

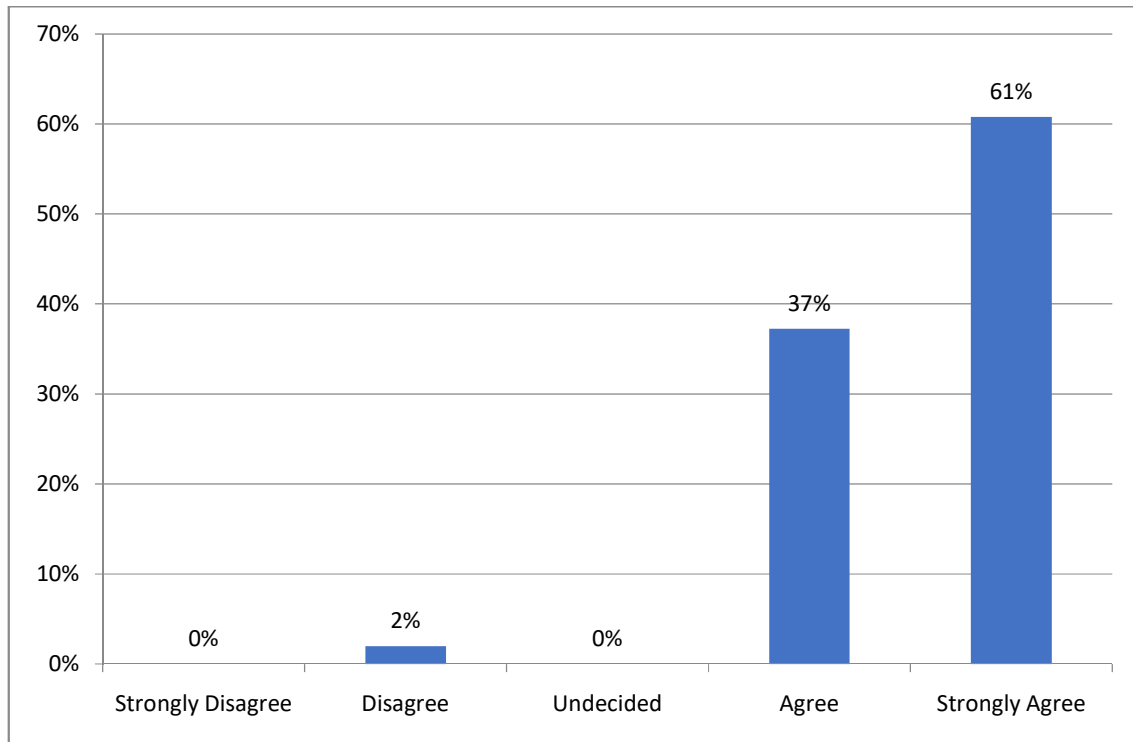


Figure 2.5 States that 61% strongly agree on the curriculum has improved the cooperation and teamwork of the students., 37% agree, 0% are undecided, 2% disagree and 0% strongly disagree.

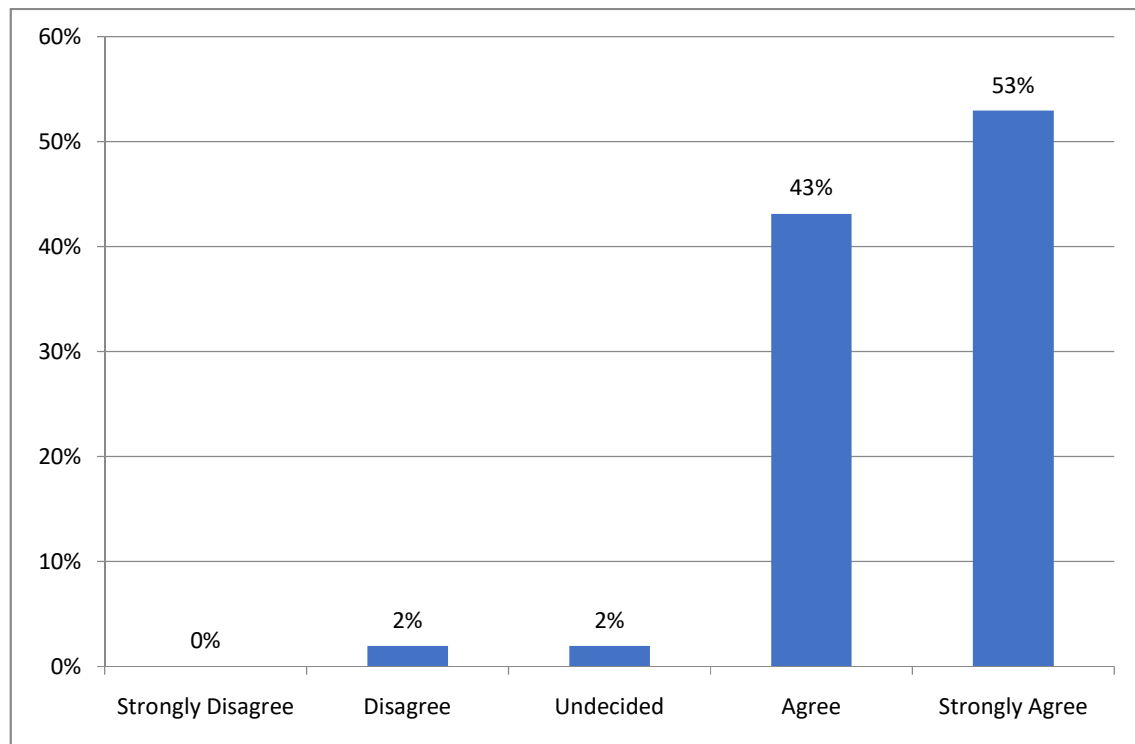


Figure 2.6 From the data received, it was observed that 53% of the faculty strongly agree that the curriculum has raised the digital literacy levels of the students, 43% agree, 2 % undecided, 2% disagree whereas 0% strongly disagree.

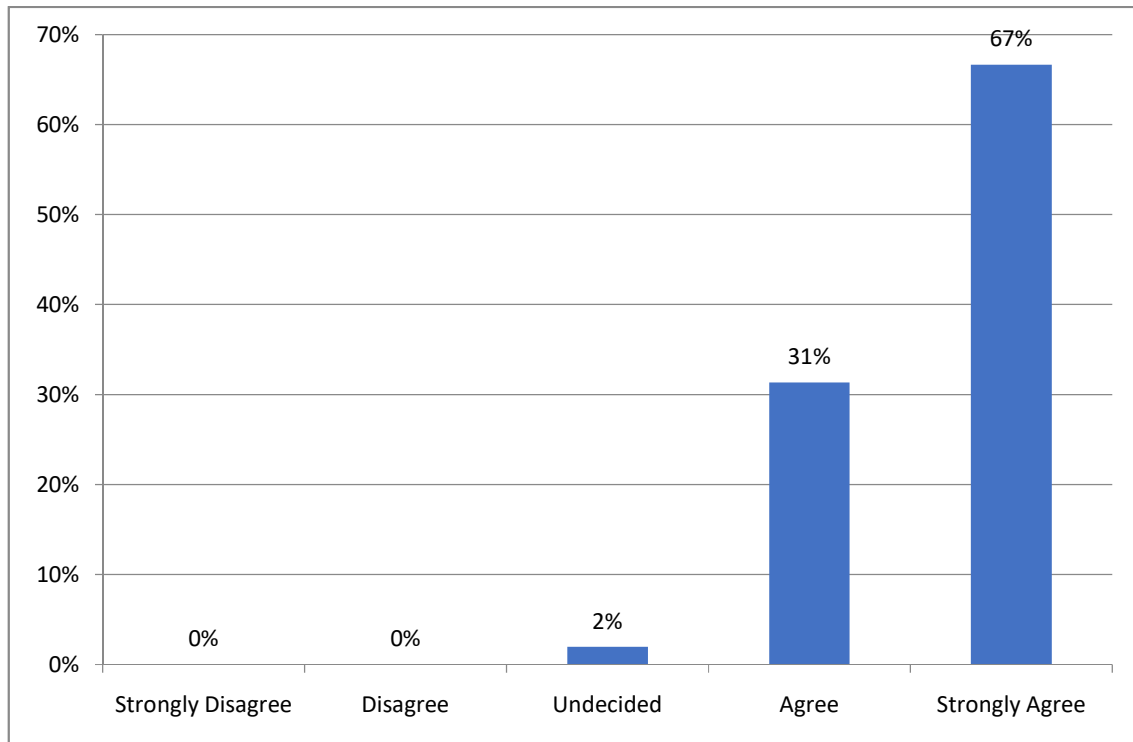


Figure 2.7 The above figure shows that 67% of the faculty strongly agree, 31% agree, 2% undecided, 0% faculty chose disagree and strongly disagree option regarding the students have gained experiential and life-long learning through the curriculum.

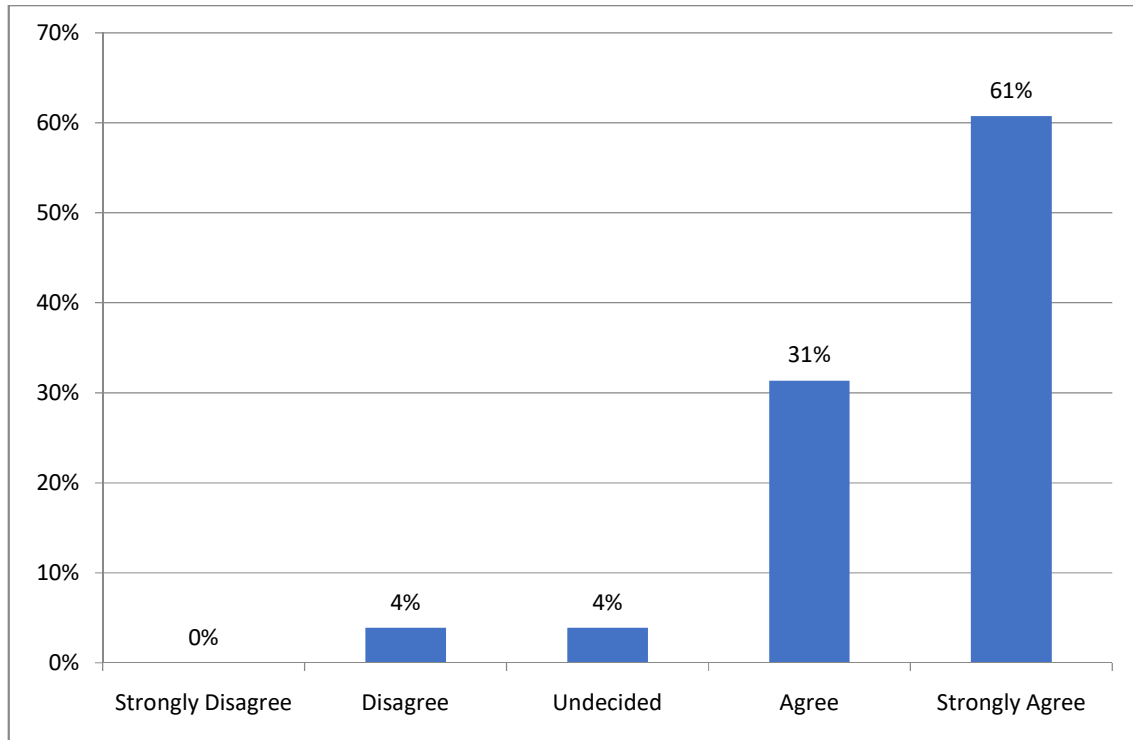


Figure 2.8 Shows that 61% strongly agree, 31% agree, 4% undecided, 4% disagree whereas 0% strongly disagree on the curriculum has inculcated leadership, qualities, professional and decision-making skills in the students.

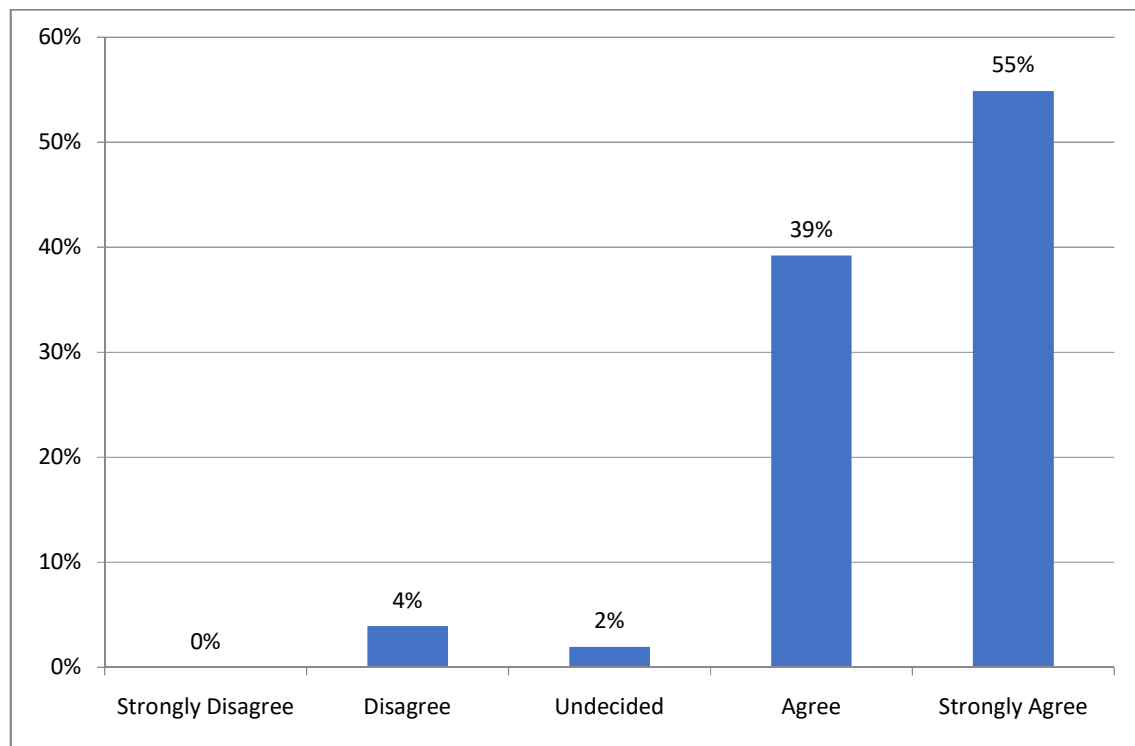


Figure 2.9 Shows that 55% of the faculty members strongly agree, 39% agree, 2% remain undecided, 4% disagree and 0% strongly disagree that the curriculum has developed and improved the entrepreneurial skills and employability skills in the students.

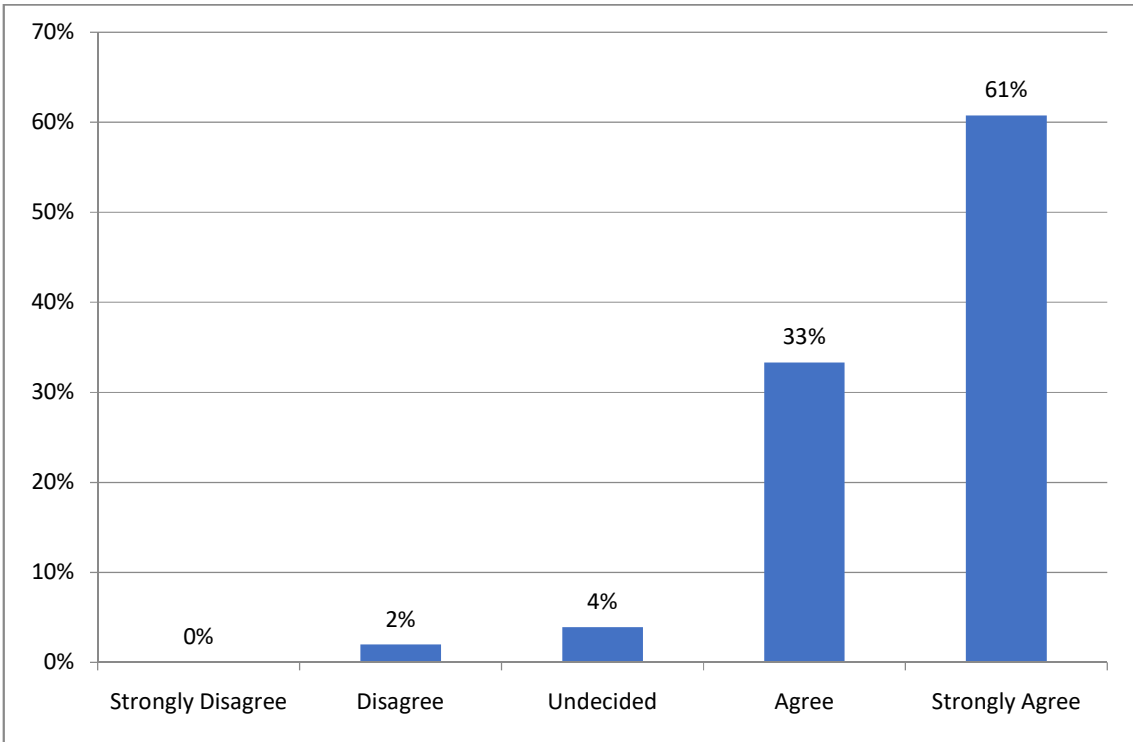


Figure 2.10 States that 61% of the faculty members strongly agree, 33% agree, 4% undecided, 2% disagree and 0% strongly disagree that the students are able to address cross-cutting issues relevant to issues like professional ethics, gender, human values, Sustainable Development Goals, environment and sustainability after it was incorporated in the curriculum.

Recommendations

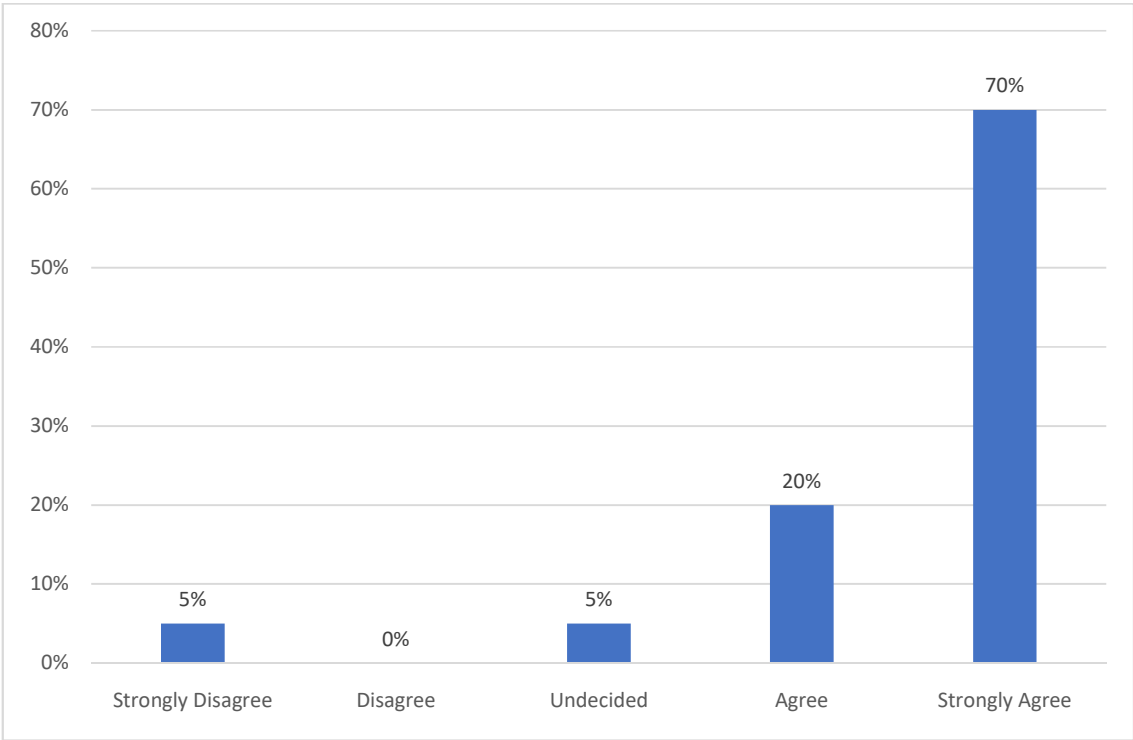


Figure 3.1It was observed that 70% of the employers strongly agree, 20% agree, 5% were undecided, 0% disagree and 5% strongly disagree on the curriculum inspires the students to adapt themselves in a changing environment.

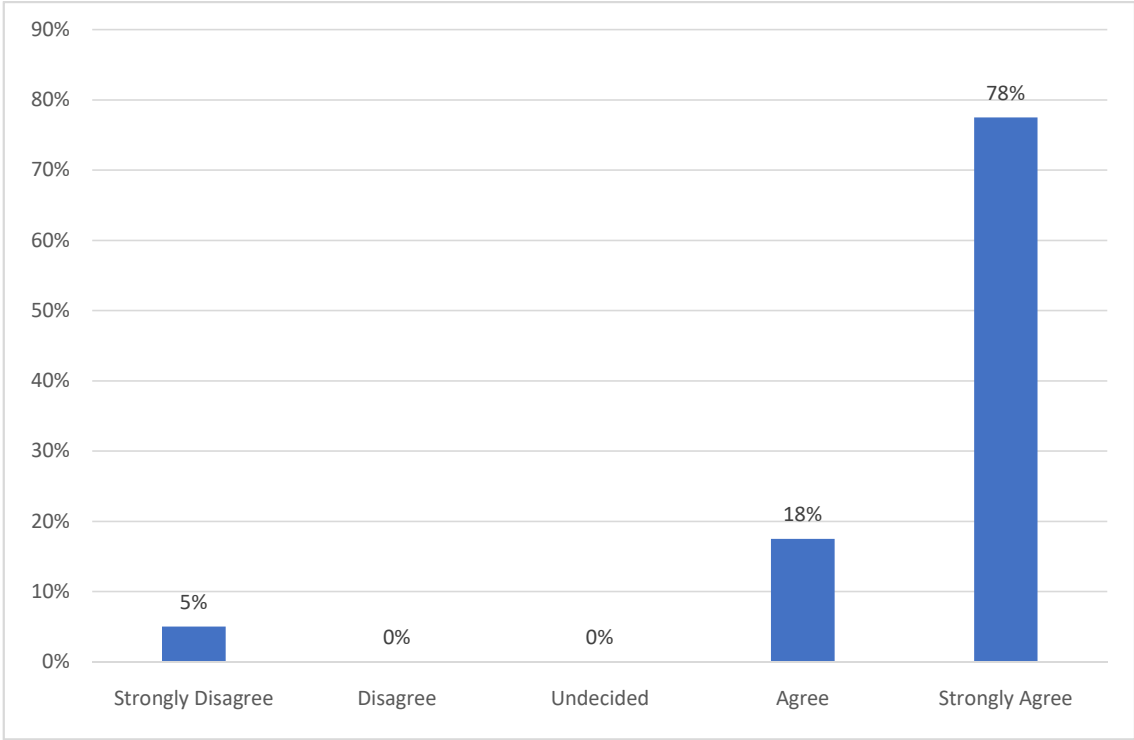


Figure 3.2 States that 78% of the employer strongly agree that the curriculum connects with local and global needs, 18% agree, 0% undecided, 0% disagree and 5% strongly disagree.

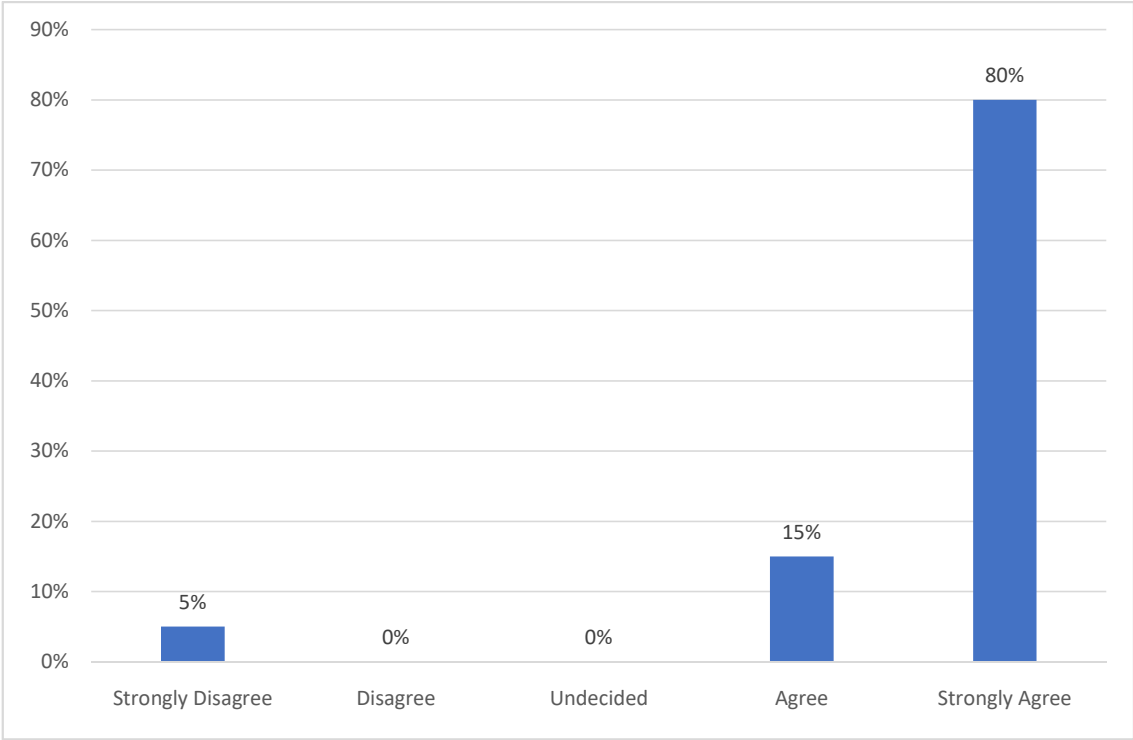


Figure 3.3Shows that 80% of the employers have strongly agreed that the curriculum teaches behavioural ethical and managerial attributes, 15% agree, 0% undecided, 0% disagree and 5% strongly disagree.

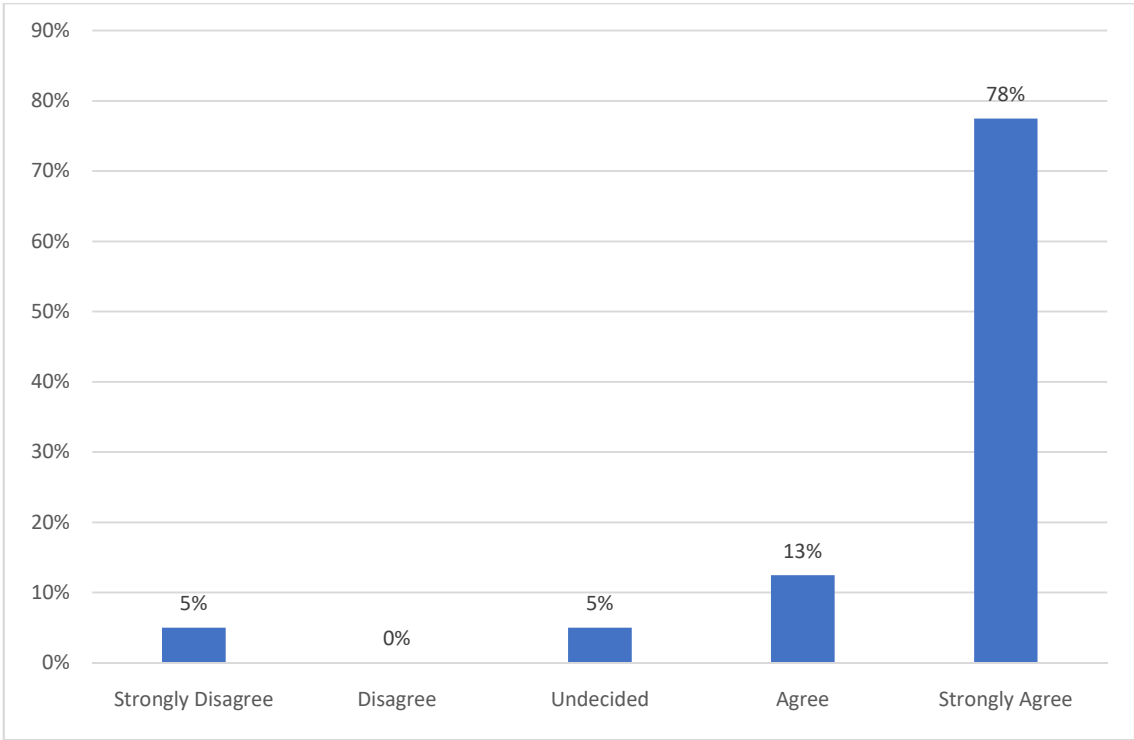


Figure 3.4States that 78% strongly agree, 13% agree, 5% undecided, 0% disagree and 5% strongly disagree on the curriculum inculcates critical thinking, communication skills, teamwork, professional ethics, and decision-making skills.

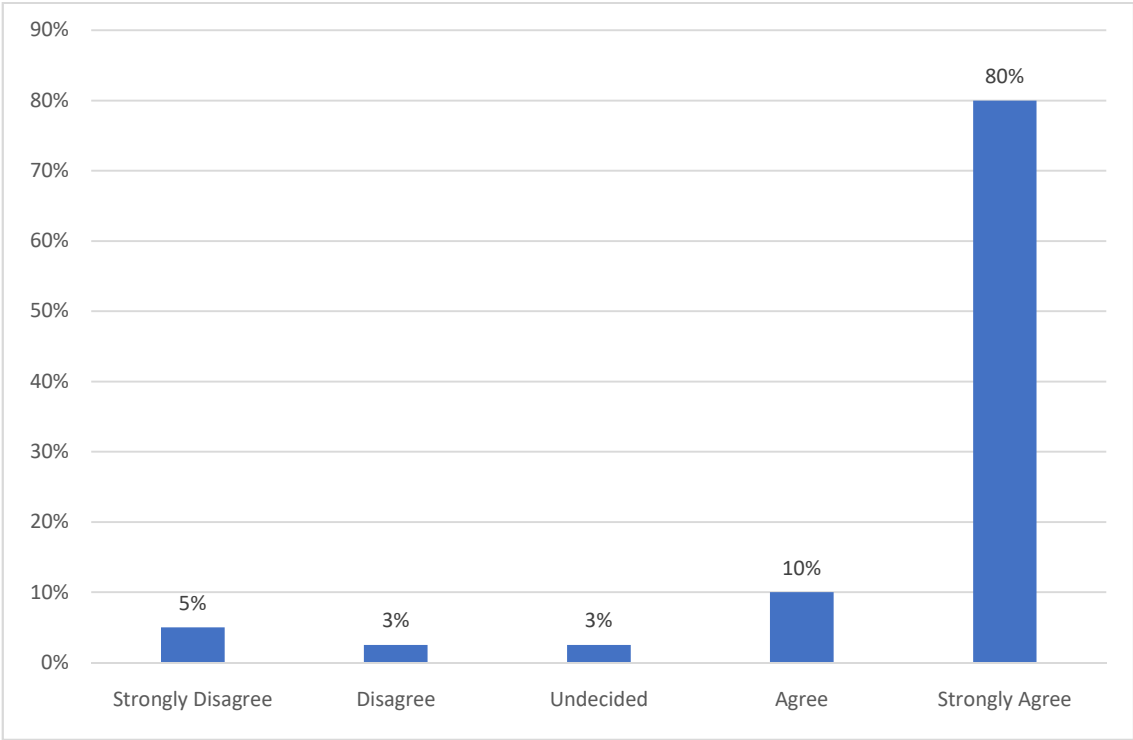


Figure 3.5 States that 80% of the employers strongly agree, 10% agree, 3% undecided, 3% disagree and 5% strongly disagree on the curriculum encourages digital literacy and the use of modern methods.

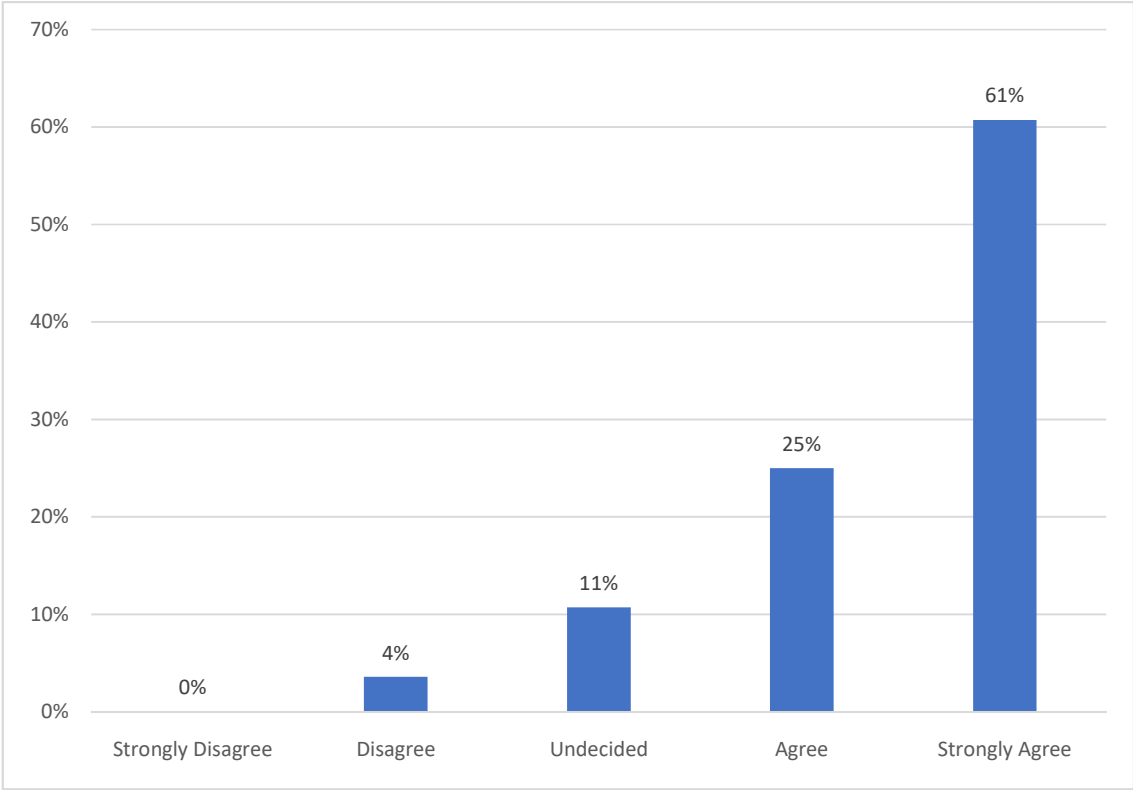


Figure 4.1 It was observed that 61% of the alumni strongly agree, 25% agree that the university encourages the alumni to contribute towards curriculum development, 11% undecided, 4% disagree and 0% strongly disagree.

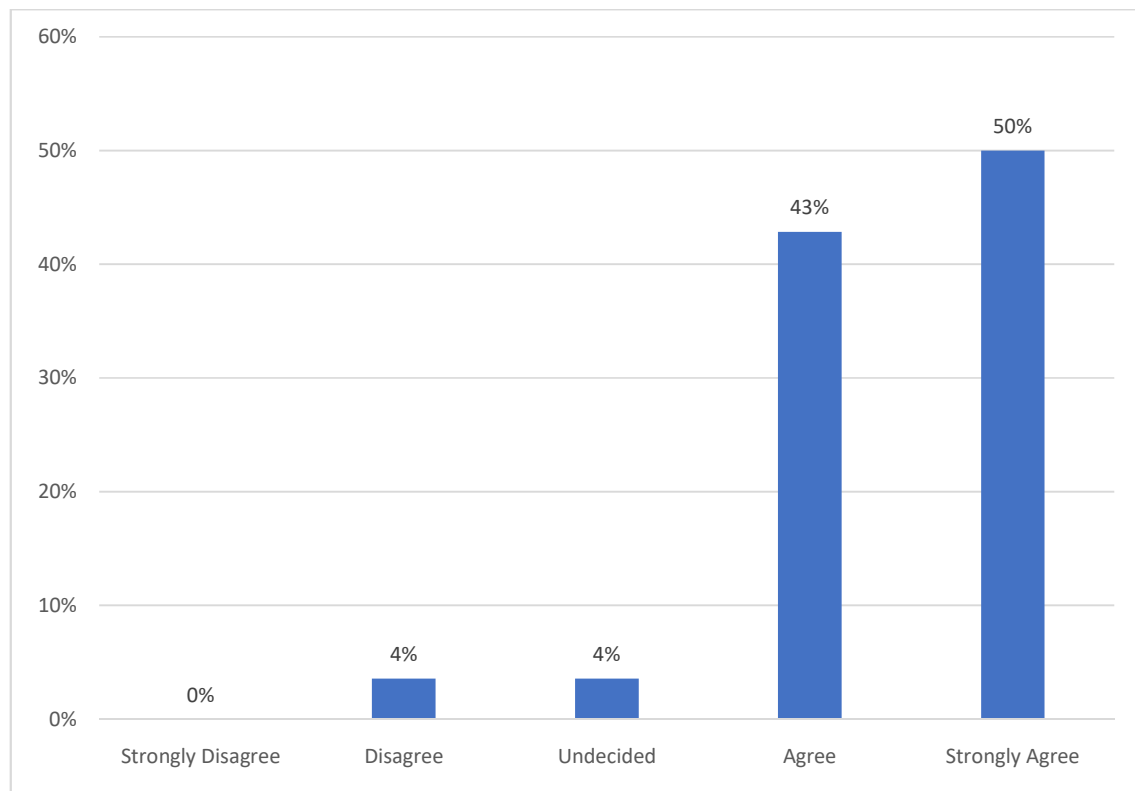


Figure 4.2 It was found that 50% of the alumni strongly agree, 43% agree, 4% disagree, 4% disagree and 0% strongly disagree on the CBCS/Elective Courses of the curriculum enhances the interdisciplinary and multidisciplinary.

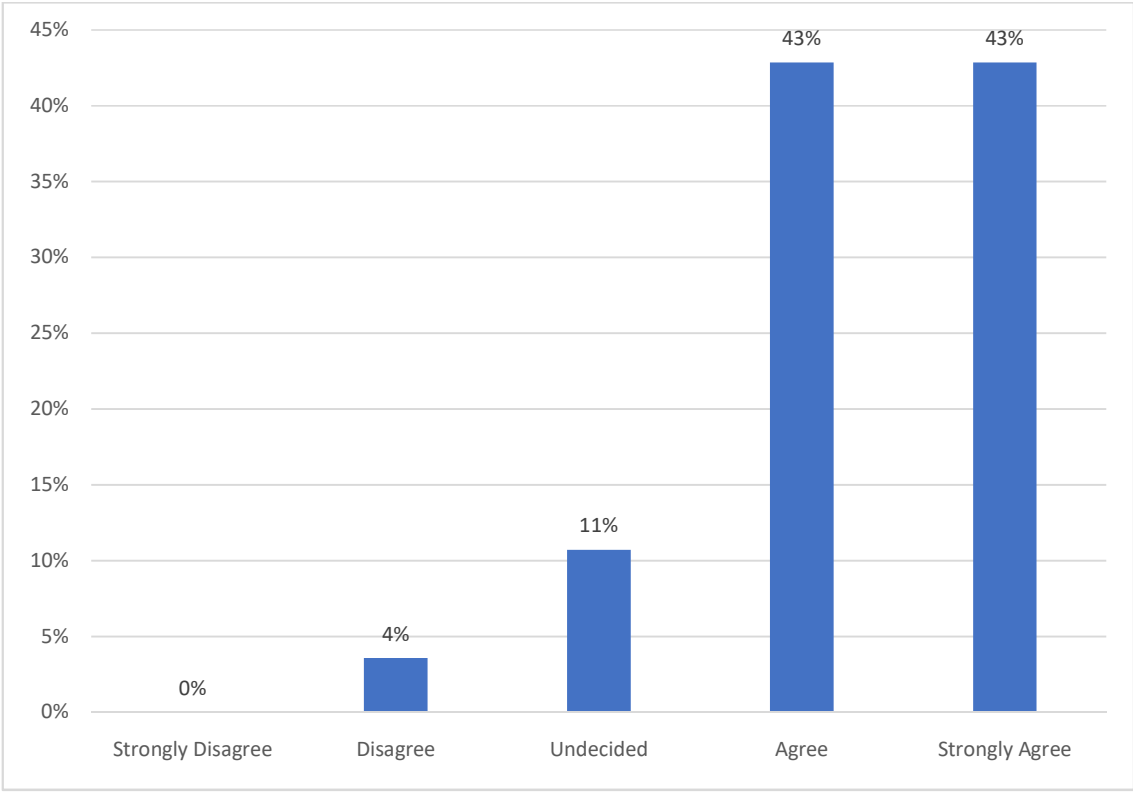


Figure 4.3 States that 43% strongly agree, 43% agree, 11% are undecided, 4% disagree whereas 0% strongly disagree on the curriculum enhances the physical and emotional well-being, and human values.

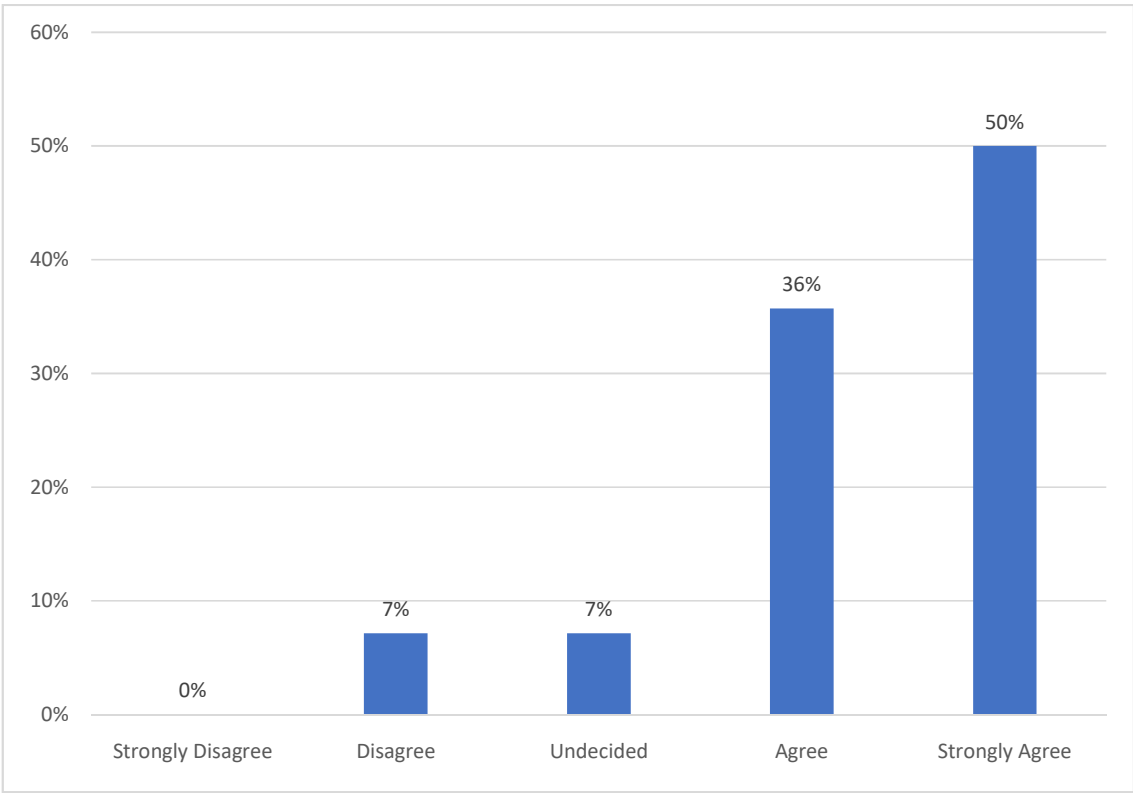


Figure 4.4 States that 50% of the alumni strongly agree, 36% agree, 7% undecided, 7% disagree and 0% strongly disagree on the curriculum provides knowledge to make use of modern methods and digital literacy.

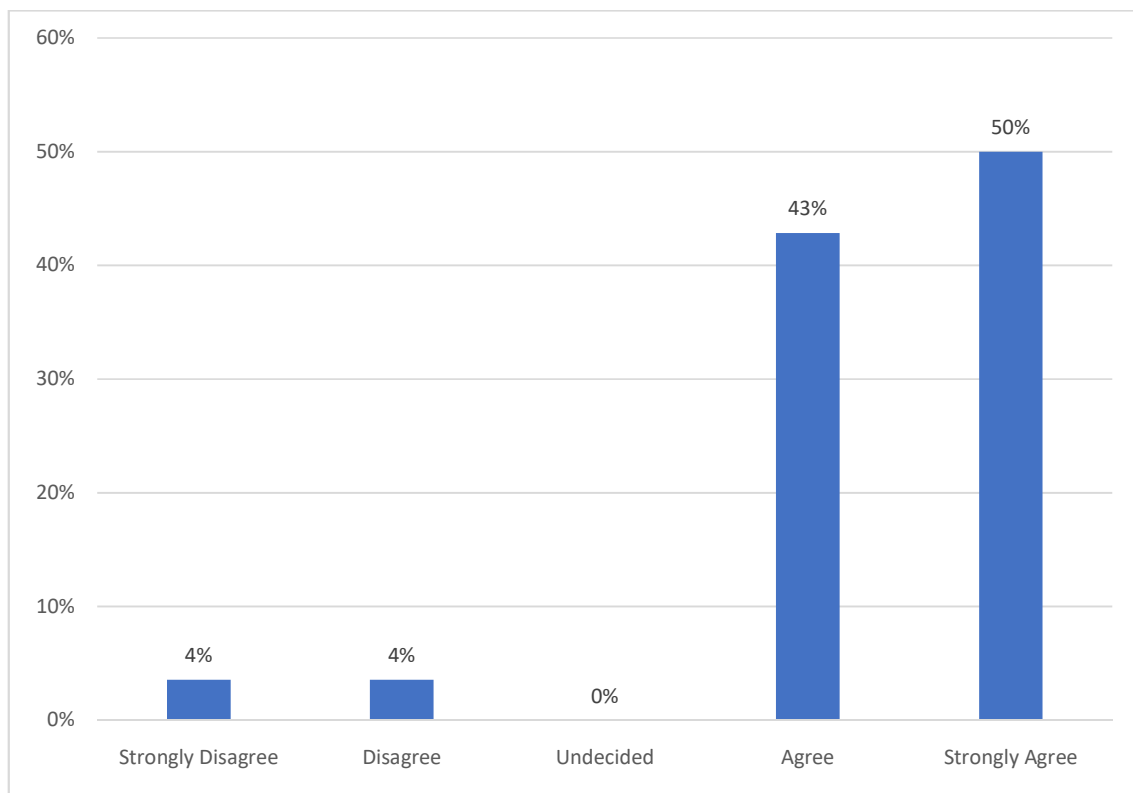


Figure 4.5 States that 50% strongly agree, 43% agree, 0% undecided, 4% disagree and 4% strongly disagree on the curriculum imparts knowledge on environment and sustainability.

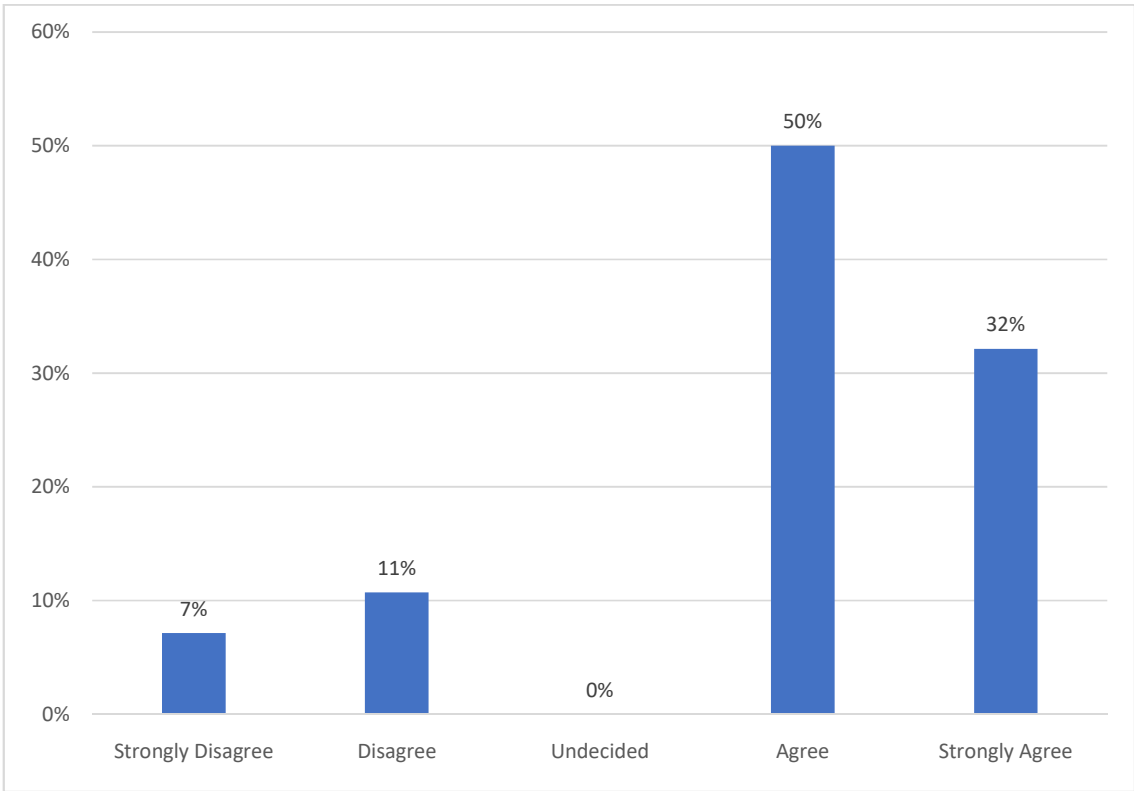


Figure 4.6 States that 32% of the alumni strongly agree that the curriculum develops curiosity, inquisitiveness for continuous and life-long learning, 50% agree, 0% undecided, 11% disagree and 7% strongly disagree.

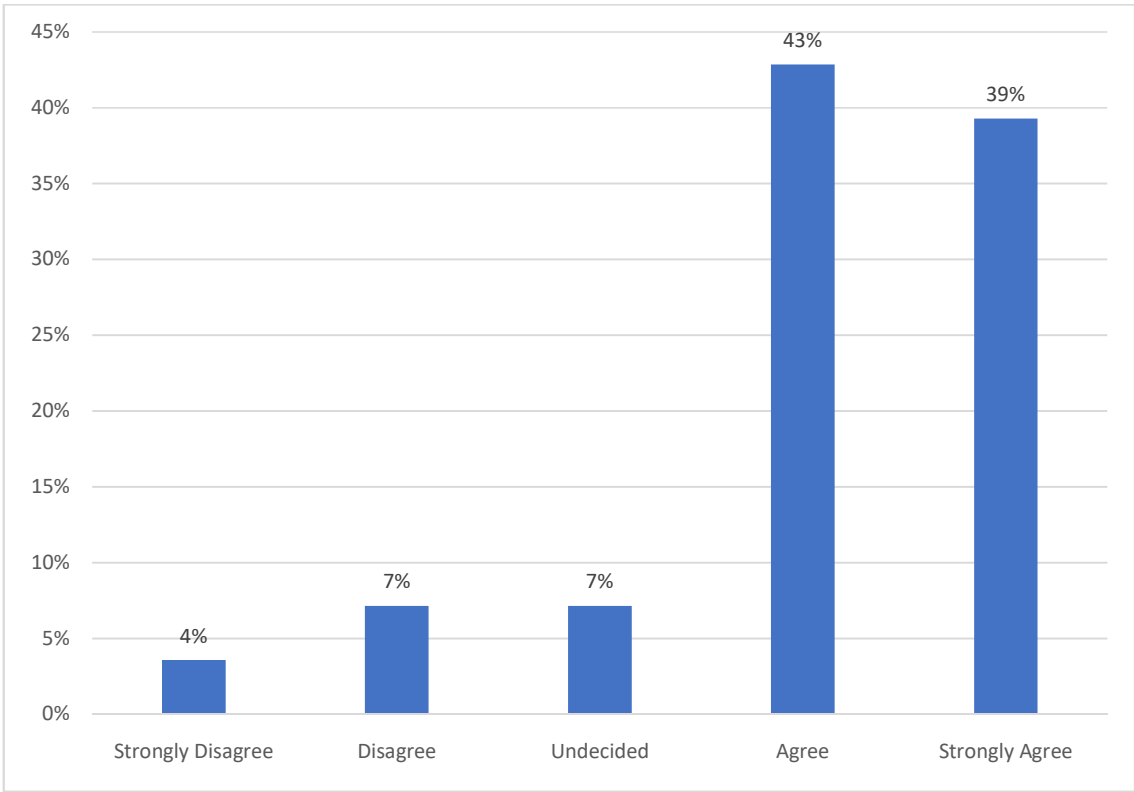


Figure 4.7 Shows that 39% of the alumni strongly agree, 43% agree, 7% undecided, 7% disagree and 4% strongly disagree on the curriculum focusses on employability skills.

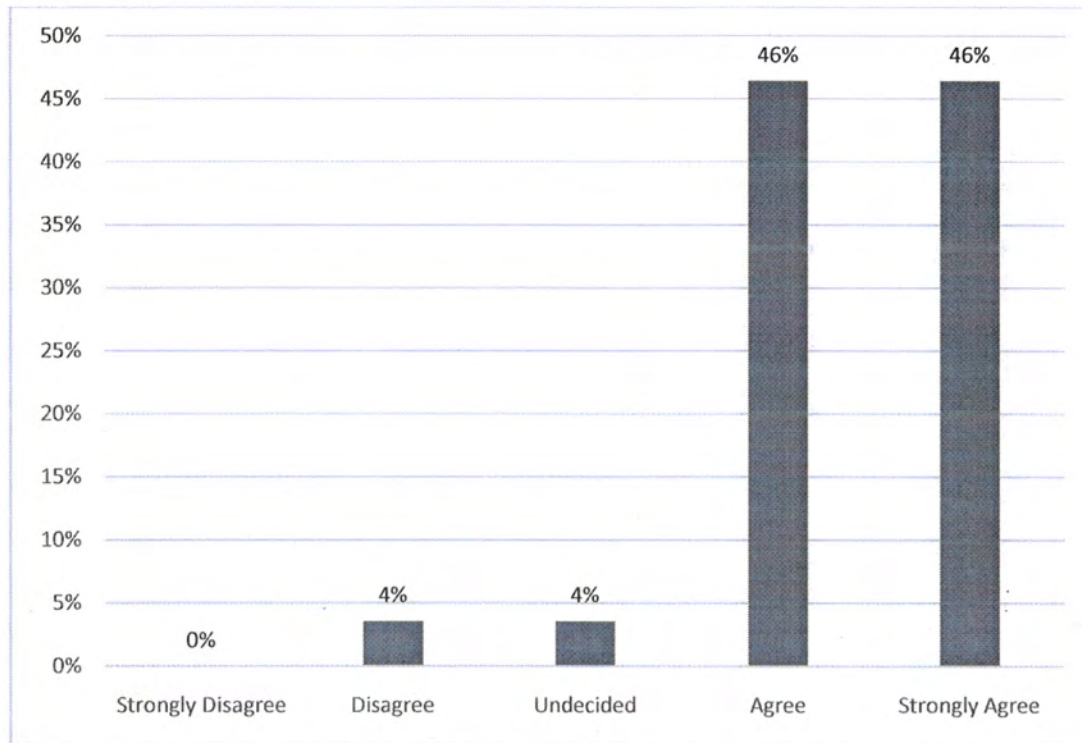



Figure 4.8 States that 46% strongly agree, 46% agree, 4% undecided and disagree respectively and 0% strongly disagree on the curriculum has helped to inculcate leadership skills, co-operation, and teamwork.



As per the suggestion the syllabi must be revised from time to time and should focus more on skill development, employability, entrepreneurship, and modern techniques. The students must be encouraged to work on real life problems and practice ethical and moral values. More emphasis to be laid on imparting behavioural and managerial attributes. Focus should also be laid on tutorial, remedial and practice classes. It was further recommended that more industrial exposure to be provided for skill enhancement.
